This triptych, carved by Steve Eggleton, is based upon the parable that Jesus told about two sons of a wealthy land owner, the younger one of whom demanded his inheritance in cash. He set out upon a journey and in no time had squandered the lot. Finding himself obliged to look after pigs to earn himself a crust, and being driven by his hunger to contemplate even eating the pigs' food, he decided to return home.

"I will beg forgiveness and ask for a job as a slave" he said to himself, "at least I will have a roof over my head and I will have enough to eat."

His father loved him however and was looking out for his return. On seeing him returning, and while he was still a long way off, he ran to meet him and embraced him. He ordered that he be given beautiful new clothes to wear and a great banquet was put on to celebrate his homecoming.

You can read this story in Luke's Gospel chapter 15, verses 11-32. Jesus tells this parable to illustrate how eager God is to respond with grace when we come to him in repentance, whatever we have done.
